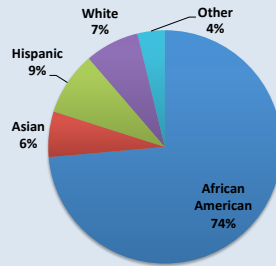

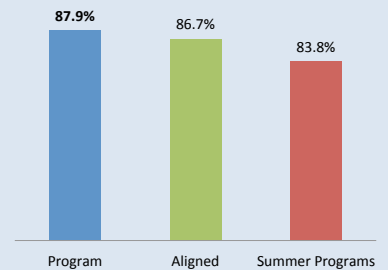

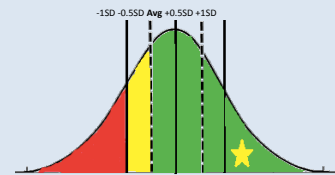

Benchmark	Threshold of program quality suggested by Boston After School and Beyond and NIOST. ✓ 3 or Higher ⚠ Lower than 3
Program	Program's current year average. 1-4 Scale (4 highest quality measure)
Aligned (n=40)	Average of cohort of summer programs who opted into the measurement system for the current year, but are not operating within Summer Learning Project (SLP) requirements. School level of 40 programs: 4 Elementary School, 4 Middle School, 12 High School and 20 that served several levels
Summer Programs (n=58)	Average of 58 summer programs including the SLP Programs and the cohort of summer programs who opted into the measurement system for the current year but are not operating within SLP requirements. School level of 58 programs: 17 Elementary Schools, 7 Middle Schools, 14 High Schools and 20 that served several levels
2012	Program's previous year average
✓	Recognition for specific program management practice (All assessment items meet the benchmark)



The green circle, yellow triangle and red diamond are indicators based on how program's average falls along a normal distribution of the overall SLP and Total Summer Programs. The 'gold star' indicates top performers.
